

What does 'looked after' mean?

Being 'looked after' means being cared for by someone else, when your own family can't look after you.

What is fostering?

Fostering is when you go to live with another family, called a foster family, who have been trained to look after you. They will help you with all the things that you need to learn as you're growing up.

YOUR FOSTER CARER(S) WILL MAKE SURE YOU HAVE EVERYTHING YOU NEED



Your carer(s) will help you to celebrate birthdays and festivals that are important to you.



They will make sure you have the chance to see people you love, and spend time with your friends.



Your carer(s) will make sure you have a cosy bedroom of your own, or with your brothers and sisters, and space to put your things.



They will make sure you can get to pre-school or school. When you have homework they will help and support you.



They will give you some pocket money to spend – you can talk to them about how much.



Your carer(s) will make sure you have a quiet and safe space to meet your social worker.




There are certain ways you should be treated no matter what; these are called your **'rights'**. You have the right:



To be kept safe, secure and protected.

To be listened to and treated fairly and equally.

To be given the information and advice you need about education and health. To access an advocate who can help you if you want to make a complaint.



To celebrate your own culture and religion.

To get help and support if you have a disability.



To know why you are being looked after by a foster family and when you can spend time with your family and friends. IFIAM BEING BULLIED, WHAT SHOULD I DO? If you are being bullied, tell someone you trust who can help you, for example, your foster carer, social worker, friend or teacher.

If you are being bullied by your foster carer or someone else who is looking after you, you must tell your social worker or another adult you trust and they will get help.

IF I WANT TO MAKE A COMPLAINT, WHAT SHOULD I DO?

At Lorimer we have something called a 'complaints procedure' so you can ask questions about what is happening to you and tell us if you are not happy with something. Whatever the problem is, we will always try and sort it out for you.

You might not be happy about your foster carer(s), social worker, school or something else.

You should talk to your foster carer, social worker or another adult you trust if you are not happy about things and they will do what they can to help you. If you are still not happy, you can make a complaint.
